40 years of Theologie interkulturell (Thi) in Frankfurt am Main

Conference Program June 26–28, 2025

With this conference the Department of Catholic Theology of the Johann Wolfgang Goethe-University celebrates the 40^{th} anniversary of "Theologie interkulturell" (Thi) – our international teaching and research focus.

To mark the anniversary, we will dedicate ourselves to a current topic with the theme "Precarious Life: Sustainability and Theology" – and pose at the same time classic questions of intercultural theology in a new way. Scientific research on sustainability is strongly focussed on political, economic and ecological issues. Within theology, there is currently a spectrum of ethical and eco-theological approaches. But what does a theology of sustainability achieve, what broader contours would it need and how should it be formulated? What can intercultural theology contribute to closing the justice gaps identified by the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)? To what extent is a reference to the transcendent or to human spirituality productive for thinking about a sustainable and nature-compatible global society? What do decolonial readings of history achieve?

These and other questions of global relevance will be examined from multiple perspectives and with international participation at the anniversary conference. The celebration starts with a <u>study week</u> for our students, researchers and guests. Meeting again or getting to know the others and their topics – accompanied by a cultural programme – is also important here. In this week the international scientists will take part in the courses offered by our department.

About Thi

In 1985 the Department of Catholic Theology at Goethe University Frankfurt am Main established the programme "Theologie interkulturell" (Thi). Since then, Thi has been dealing with the diversity of local and global Christianities worldwide, exploring the traditional relationship between "gospel and culture" in ever-changing perspectives against the backdrop contextual theologies. For 40 years, we have been welcoming international academic guests every year to discuss theological issues in dialogue with our teaching staff and students. The aim was and still is to raise awareness of the fact that religious belief, theological thinking and solidarity-based action must be considered in a global context and in terms of political challenges. A corresponding criticism of Western, anthropocentric Christianity, which often causes conflicts, crises, poverty, discrimination, exploitation and injustice, goes hand in hand with this.
